SACRAMENTS OF ANOINTING OF THE SICK AND THE EUCHARIST

These sacraments are meant for the healing and comfort of those who are ill. Please inform the priests about parishioners confined to their homes, hospitals or nursing facilities. Each month, priests call on parishioners confined at home to pray with them and bring them the Eucharist. For those who wish, Eucharistic Ministers will bring the Eucharist to the homebound on the other weeks of the month. Priests visit Creekbend Senior Citizen Complex once a month for the celebration of the Eucharist. A parish Deacon conducts a Communion Service each Friday at Lakewood Health Care Center.

BAPTISMS

The sacrament of Baptism is celebrated each Sunday at 2:00pm. Pre-Baptismal instruction for parents is conducted on the fourth Monday of each month in the rectory. Attendance at the Pre-Baptismal class is mandatory. Contact the rectory for an appointment.

MARRIAGES

Arrangements must be made with one of the parish priests at least six months in advance. All couples planning to be married in the Catholic Church in the Diocese of Buffalo must participate in an approved formal marriage preparation program.

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

Letter of recommendation are issued only to registered parishioners who are at least 16, have been confirmed, and attend mass and receive the sacraments regularly.

HEARING IMPAIRED

Aids for those with impaired hearing are available in the priests' sacristy. To obtain one, come to the sacristy before mass and ask the priest.

PARISH LITURGICAL ACTIVITIES

WORSHIP COMMITTEE

This committee assists the priests and parish organizations in developing meaningful liturgies. They also assist in decorating the church for special holidays. The committee coordinates, organizes and provides educational opportunities for the various liturgical ministries. The group meets monthly.

EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS

Eucharistic Ministers assist with distribution of Holy Communion at masses. They are sometimes called upon to take Communion to the homebound, sick and elderly. They also assist in the distribution of Communion at Lakewood Health Care each Friday. One-day training sessions for new Eucharistic Ministers are sponsored by the Diocese on a monthly basis, usually on Saturdays at Christ the King Seminary in East Aurora.

LECTORS

Lectors proclaim the word of God from scripture and lead the congregation in the Prayer of the Faithful during masses. Any

confirmed parishioner is eligible. Training is provided. Lectors usually serve at one mass per month.

ALTAR SERVERS

Altar servers assist the priest at masses and other liturgies. In general, girls and boys assist at weekend masses and adult servers assist at weekday masses. Fifth and sixth grade boys and girls who attend our school or Religious Education program are invited to become altar servers. New altar servers attend two training sessions in the fall to learn their responsibilities. Weekend servers typically serve once a month and may serve as long as they wish. Altar servers are invited to an annual summer picnic and Christmas party.

USHERS

Ushers assist in maintaining a dignified, reverent atmosphere during liturgical celebrations. They greet people, facilitate seating, take up collections and see to the needs of the congregation.

WEDDING COORDINATORS

Wedding Coordinators assist the priest celebrant and the wedding party by facilitating a timely beginning for all wedding celebrations.

MUSIC MINISTRY

Senior Choir (high school - adults): Performs both traditional and contemporary music. Emphasis is on good choral technique and voice production. This choir sings at the 10:45 Sunday mass and rehearses Wednesdays at 7:00pm. Voice placement is required.

Contemporary Ensemble (high school - adult): Performs mostly contemporary music with the accompaniment of piano, guitar and other instruments. This group sings at the 9:15 Sun-

day mass and rehearses Thursdays at 7:30pm. Voice placement and instrument audition is required.

EDUCATION

SS PETER AND PAUL SCHOOL

1. Philosophy: Saints Peter and Paul Elementary School strives to focus primarily on the process of developing the potential that lies within each of its students. This process is nurtured in an atmosphere of kindness, love and understanding. Students are encouraged to view themselves and others as unique, valuable and capable individuals worthy of respect. Within the framework of love of God, self and others, students are given ample opportunity to experience spiritual growth and a deeper understanding of and respect for their Catholic faith and Christian principles, with an existing balance between religious teaching and experience.

2. Instruction: Saints Peter and Paul Elementary School provides a preschool program for children age 3 - 4, as well as a full day kindergarten and Grades 1 - 8. An extended day care program is offered for both before and after school hours. The instructional program of the school is designed to meet the curriculum of the New York State Department of Education and the Diocese of Buffalo. The spiritual growth and development of each child is emphasized through teaching the fundamental truths of our Catholic faith, understanding scripture, and celebrating liturgy and sacraments. Our qualified teachers are dedicated to teaching Christian morals and values, and continually strive for academic excellence. Tuition for both the preschool and kindergarten - 8th grade programs is affordable and is reviewed annually by the Parish Finance Committee.

3. History: Saints Peter and Paul Elementary School was opened in 1874 as both an elementary and high school. In 1933, the high school was closed. The school was staffed by

the Sisters of Saint Francis until 1988. Today, Saints Peter and Paul School is staffed by a lay administration and faculty, with great support from the rectory and parents. Teachers strive to bring the gospel message of Jesus to students in their teaching and their example.

4. Parents Guild: This group of dedicated parents and teachers work together to coordinate social functions which bring our school families together. They also sponsor fund-raising activities to benefit both the children and school building in areas that would not otherwise be enhanced or improved.

NEW PARISHIONER WELCOME COMMITTEE

This committee is dedicated to welcoming individuals and families to Saints Peter and Paul parish in an atmosphere of 'parish family.' Committee members schedule and conduct meetings during which new parishioners have an opportunity to meet our priests and parish members, view a video on parish life, share refreshments and register. New parishioners are also invited to become active in one or more of the various parish ministries. Active participation not only strengthens our parish community, it also helps give those involved a further sense of belonging.

PARISH OUTREACH (36 Pine Street, 648-1725, 9:00 - 4:00 Monday - Friday)

Parish Outreach is a community of people who care for, support, encourage, challenge, and affirm one another as concerned and caring neighbors. We are a 'servant church' who hopes to give witness to Christ and His compassionate concern to others. Areas of ministry include:

- Visits to the homebound, elderly, and those in hospitals and nursing homes
- Taking Holy Communion to the sick and homebound
- Being a Eucharistic Minister at Lakewood Health Care
- Providing assistance to those in need of transportation

- Helping parishioners when a family member dies (see Bereavement Committee)
- Food Pantry that is open to anyone in the Hamburg area who is experiencing financial difficulty. Clothing is available on Thursday mornings from 9:30 - 11.30am.

We are grateful to anyone willing to donate furnishings or household items in good condition. Outreach is often called upon for these items by other parishes or agencies, not only for Hamburg residents but also for people anywhere in the South-towns, Lackawanna, or Buffalo. The Outreach office has reference materials on hand for various human services available to individuals and families. If you have a problem and don't know where to turn for help - call us.

BEREAVEMENT COMMITTEE

This empathetic group helps a family when they experience the death of one of their loved ones by helping them plan the funeral liturgy, including the selection of readings and music. Training is provided for parishioners who wish to join this ministry.

HEALTH RESOURCE MINISTRY

This group of volunteers includes retired nurses who are concerned about the health and well being of our parish community. These services are not intended, nor should they be used as a substitute for medical care from a physician. Services include: 1) blood pressure screening and flu vaccinations; 2) an opportunity to talk to a nurse about health care concerns; 3) help to understand and comply with a physician's advice; and 4) preparation of the Health column in the weekly church bulletin.

MINISTRY OF PRAISE

This is a spiritual ministry in which members promise to pray at home each day for the needs of the world and, in particular, for

parish members and parish needs. New members receive a cross, book of prayers, and a certificate at a formal commissioning service. Each month, members receive a letter from the parish which outlines several parish intentions. This ministry is open to all parishioners, including those who are sick, disabled or homebound.

MISSION

The object of the 8-day experience is to help renew the Christian life in individuals and help build community life within the parish. Those who have made Mission meet periodically throughout the year. They also plan and help carry out future parish Missions.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

This program provides religious training to all public elementary and secondary school children of our parish. Classes are held as follows:

Grades 1 - 5: Tuesday afternoon

Grades 1 - 5: Saturday morning

Grades 6 - 10: Sunday evening

Grades 6 - 10: Monday evening

Grade 11: Confirmation preparation, Sunday evening, as scheduled.

Volunteers are always needed for teaching and for other tasks related to this ministry. Teacher training is provided. Call the religious education office (649-0231) or stop in to see one of the directors. The office is located in Room 107 in the school. Policies and program fees are evaluated annually.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)

This is the process by which adults become members of the Roman Catholic Church and receive any or all of the sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation). It is a

conversion journey concerned with the total formation of the individual and the believing Church community. This journey includes a team and sponsors who, acting as representatives of the larger Church community, accompany the candidates through the various stages of the Rite. This process culminates with the celebration of the sacraments of Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation at the Easter Vigil.

ADULT ENRICHMENT

This committee presents a variety of programs and events for adults of the parish throughout the year. Past events have included: 5-day retreat with visiting priests, weekly Bible classes following the Little Rock Scripture Study program, and visiting speakers on topics such as prayer, saints and religious education. Occasional bus trips to religious art shows. Meetings are the second Monday of the month, September - June.

BIBLE SHARING

This discussion group meets weekly to share their reflections on God's word found in the Bible. The group follows the outline of the book "God's Word Today" and each member progresses at their own pace. The group meets weekly on Tuesdays from 9:30 - 11:30am.

PARISH SERVICE

PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Council is a representative body of the greater parish. It is composed of 12 elected representatives and 10 non-elected representatives who are heads of various parish organizations. Parish Council functions through various committees including Worship, Education, Youth, Buildings and Grounds, and Finance. Parish Council is a forum where parish related ideas, suggestions and concerns are discussed and acted upon. It

serves in an advisory capacity to the pastor and takes a leadership role in the on-going development of the parish.

Meetings are held on the third Monday of the month (September - June) at 7:00pm in the rectory conference room. Parishioners are welcome to attend meetings and are encouraged to voice their concerns to Parish Council members. A list of members and minutes of meetings is published in the church bulletin. Any parishioners who are interested in serving on Parish Council are encouraged to speak to one of the current members.

BUILDINGS AND GROUND COMMITTEE

This committee is comprised of parish volunteers with expertise in administration and the trades (construction, engineering, electrical, carpentry and plumbing). The committee advises the pastor on matters relating to the stewardship of the buildings and property owned by the parish. It meets monthly with the pastor to discuss non-day to day issues concerning parish property.

FINANCE COUNCIL

This Council was formed in accordance with canon law to assist the pastor in the business administration of the parish. Members are appointed by the pastor and have financial, accounting, management, law, or business expertise. The Council meets monthly with the pastor to provide financial and administrative advice on operating a fiscally sound parish, assuring that parishioner donations are spent wisely. They help prepare, review and approve the budget, monthly financial statements and the preparation of the annual financial report to parishioners. The Council also assists in the development of the policies and procedures and internal controls necessary to preserve the integrity of parish finances.

PARISH ORGANIZATIONS AND RELIGIOUS SOCIETIES

ALTAR AND ROSARY SOCIETY

These women of the parish are dedicated to the Blessed Mother through the rosary. Responsible for the beautiful care of the altar, these ladies also make bibs for baptisms of newborns and straighten our church after weekend masses. The Society attends monthly mass as a group, plans an annual retreat and sponsors a bus trip to 7 churches on Holy Thursday. Members provide a Guard of Honor at member's funerals. Meetings are the second Tuesday of the month, September - June.

CHARISMATIC PRAYER GROUP

This group conducts year-round prayer meetings every Wednesday at 7:30pm in the Parish Center Chapel. On the first Wednesday of each month, a Communion Service is held. Meetings and services are preceded by the praying of the Rosary at 7:00pm. Anyone who wishes to attend any or all of these services is most welcome. Also, sessions for growth in the spiritual life by developing a relationship with Jesus (Life in the Spirit seminars) are held at least twice a year, in the fall and spring. Registration for these sessions is open to anyone.

PRO-LIFE COMMITTEE

The primary concern of this committee is to encourage parishioners to reaffirm their Christian commitment to life by working and praying to safeguard human life at all stages from conception to natural death. The committee depends on the guidance of the Diocesan Pro-Life Office and keeps the parish informed and participates in scheduled local and national Pro-Life activities. New members are always welcome.

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY

This society is a compassionate hand of the parish. Their work is made possible through donations, special collections, and the congregation's generosity in the Poor Boxes in the church. Their goal is to help the needy successfully cope with emergency situations by helping provide food, clothing and shelter on a short-term basis. If more assistance is needed, contact is made with the established social agencies. Holiday time is challenging for Vincentarians, as they work with Parish Outreach to provide holiday food baskets for less fortunate families. Other works include weekly visits to Heritage House and Lakewood Health Care. Members also serve as acolytes at daily masses and at all funeral masses. The ministry also offers girls and boys the opportunity for a summer camping experience at the St. Vincent DePaul Camp in Angola, NY. They also help the Diocesan Dining Room and another dining room in South Buffalo for the poor and needy. Members are ready to assist in emergency situations such as floods, hurricanes, etc. This ministry is not restricted to only those within the parish boundaries - they are often asked to assist the needy in other areas.

SOCIAL MINISTRY

The primary concern of this committee is to help those dealing with issues of poverty and social injustice in, and beyond, the confines of our own community. With the help of many parishioners, some of the committee's projects are:

- Providing a meal on a monthly basis to Night People, Inc.
- Sponsoring an annual dinner and one or two other fund raisers
- Helping Buffalo central city parishes

- Providing household supplies, clothing, toiletries and other items to groups who are helping refugees, troubled teens, AIDS victims, etc.
- Working in conjunction with Parish Outreach on various projects

YOUTH GROUP

Saints Peter and Paul Youth Group is a spiritual, social, and service oriented organization for teens. It is open to all students in grades 7 - 12 who belong to our parish. On the **spiritual side**, we offer such things as bible study, prayer groups, participation in Living Stations of the Cross, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, Wednesday mass/breakfast, and the rosary at different times of the year on the parish grounds. Off-site, we also attend conferences, Diocesan masses, visits to area shrines and abbeys, and the March for Life in Washington, DC.

Socially, we offer open gym nights, lock-ins, ice cream socials, basketball clinics and tournaments, softball, roller skating, movie nights, dances and bowling. Social events are held in parish facilities and off the grounds. For **service projects**, we help out at area soup kitchens, St. Luke's Mission, and Appalachia, and have benefits such as car washes, rock-a-thons, walk-a-thons, lock-ins, with the proceeds going to different places of need such as the Franciscan Center, St. Luke's, Friends of the Night People and Catholic Charities.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS (36 Pierce Avenue, Hamburg, 649-9830)

The Knights of Columbus is an international organization of Roman Catholic men and their families that was founded in 1882 by Rev. Michael McGivney. It now has over 1,500,000 members worldwide and 9,000 councils or local branches in the US. Members must be 18 years or older and practicing Catho-

lics. The K of C building on Pierce Avenue is a local landmark with attractive club quarters, a basketball court, and spacious halls for social events.
